V.I. chess players headed to national tourney in Atlanta

ST. THOMAS - Jermaine Jones of E. Benjamin Oliver Elementary School can usually beat his dad at chess.

Now, Howard Jones said his fourthgrader don is ready to take on the rest of the country.

"We play occasionally, but he beats me," Jones said about the 9-year old. "He's better than me now."

Jermaine is among 17 Virgin Islands students who will test their skills this weekend in Atlanta at the United States Chess Federation national championships.

"It was a good experience, but I lost every game," Berry, now 15, said. "It was an open tournament, so I was playing people who have been playing their whole lives. After that I started practicing every day."

Berry hopes to win at least four matches in the seven-round event.

After the competition, the group will visit either a museum, aquarium or other educational tour on Monday.
